I have worked with the Eastchester School Foundation for the past several years with their Harlem Wizard yearly event. The goal of that event is to raise money for the Eastchester School district to improve classrooms, facilities, and to enhance extra help classes. My specific role has been to oversee all merchandise sales and to train the student volunteers for the show. That has been a huge responsibility, but it has helped me to mature and to develop important skills that have enabled me to serve more effectively. The proceeds that were raised are converted to grants which allow teachers to purchase essentials to make a better learning environment for students. In addition, I have been a board member for The Youth Community Fund. Here I raise money and participate in selecting local charities to receive grants in order for them to further help those in need and also to promote their good works in my community. It's been great to have a direct hand in supporting worthy causes and people who seek to make a positive difference in my community.

For my senior service project at Fordham Prep, I chose to volunteer at Willow Towers, an assisted living residence in New Rochelle, New York. It has been a pleasure to accompany older people through this service. It has helped me to better understand the challenges people face as they age, and the power of something as simple as listening to a story or playing a game. I have met some wonderful people in residence and on the staff. Their commitment and courage inspire me to go back each time. I learn something new every time I serve.
