Committed to community service, I co-founded the nonprofit organization Medical Marvels in 2020. With over 900 high school and undergraduate members in just 6 months, Medical Marvels aims to promote medical literacy and provide free STEM/Humanities resources to all students. With a student published blog, free virtual shadowing events with medical professionals, and student led Research Discussions, we strive to educate others safely during the pandemic.
